



### 2008 All AMC Car show

Wally Parks Motorsports Museum hosted the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual West Coast All AMC Car Show on May 31, 2008. Formally known as simply the "NHRA Museum," it turned out to be a great location for the SoCalAMX.net group to hold its show this year. AMC and Rambler fans arrived




from all over Southern California, including a few from Nevada and Arizona, to complete the show field total of 47 cars. Because of the 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the AMX and Javelins, an area inside the museum's fence was utilized to honor those cars, and was quickly filled up by the cars who registered early. The remainder of the cars parked next to the fence in a long straight row. There was a steady crowd throughout the late morning and early afternoon show gawking over the cars. We had a nice assortment of "Kenosha Cadillacs," which included a Marlin, SC/Rambler, 4 Gremlins, 2



Pacers, 11 Ramblers, 14 Javelins, and 14 AMXs.

The show ran smoothly from early setup to when the trophies were awarded around 3pm.







# MARK'S TECH TIP

Okay, I have a tech tip for everyone. I used to have a problem with oil leaking out from around the harmonic balancer where it goes through the oil seal of the timing chain cover. There's an easy fix to the problem and it sure stopped the leaking on my car. Here is what causes the leak..

What happens over time is that the oil seal wears a small groove on the shaft of the harmonic balancer

and oil leaks out from around that point. According to the service manual the seal is supposed to be installed or replaced from the inside out, which requires taking off the timing chain cover and all the front end engine goodies such as the alter-



nator, power steering pump, and radiator.

Some people being lazy or practical, however you look at it, resorted to installing the seal from the outside. If they did so then over time a second groove would start to wear on the harmonic balancer shaft, and oil would leak again.

Here is what you need to do. Go to just about any good auto supply store and ask for a harmonic balancer repair sleeve. It only costs around \$10 or

Already SoCalAMX has word of several drivers who are planning on joining the caravan of AMC's

less and it's simply a stainless steel sleeve that fits over the shaft of the harmonic balancer. Your harmonic balancer will never get another groove on the shaft, and your oil leak will go away.

But there's a secret to installing this simple sleeve. It took us (my uncle and I) two sleeves to figure it out ourselves. Before installing the sleeve put the harmonic balancer in the freezer for 30 minutes, and put the stainless steel sleeve in the sun for the same length of time. The balancer will contract,



and the sleeve will expand, just enough so that the sleeve will slip onto the shaft with little force.

All that is left to do is reinstall the harmonic balancer through the timing chain cover. You can install the new seal on the

inside or outside, it works both ways. The only way that it can start to leak again is if over time the seal gets old and hard. But you won't have a leak from a groove in your harmonic balancer.

Last summer I drove my AMX 1010 miles to Denver for the 2008 AMO Convention and didn't have a drop of oil on the front of the oil pan area when I returned home. Good stuff!

# **Mr. and Mrs. Breedlove** went for a nice, long, Sunday drive in an AMX.

They drove right into Monday and 3,380 miles later they broke 77 speed records.

On Thursday and Saturday they came back and broke 13 more records.

Andon the following Tuesday, they broke 16 more. All in all the Breedloves set

a total of 106 records in the 1968 AMX. 90 Class C records were broken (with a modification of the standard AMX 290 CID engine bored out to 304 CID).

AMX's average speed for 24 hours was 140.790 m.p.h. The old mark was 102.310.

The AMX also broke 16 records in Class B (with a modification of the optional 390 CID engine bored out to 397 CID).

For 1,000 kilometers standing start the AMX averaged 156,548 m.p.h. The old record was 148.702.

For 75 miles flying start it averaged 174.295 m.p.h. The old record was 172.160.

Every rec-

ord set by the specially prepared and modified AMX's was sanctioned by USCA and FIA.

And this is just the beginning.

That's every record in the book from 25 kilometers to 5,000 kiloand flying starts.
